2025 Oklahoma Comprehensive Water Plan



- Oklahoma's economy, population, tourism growing
- Water infrastructure aging and undersized (water/wastewater/dams /stormwater)
- Extreme weather events becoming more frequent (drought/flood/freeze)
- New technologies and policies for water efficiency, conservation, reuse, energy/cost optimization
- Opportunities for new partnerships and more holistic vision for local and state water management and investment





OCWP 2025 Approaches and Investigations

- **Drill-down on planning**: elevate flood resiliency planning, business case for drought/flood prevention/investment, regional and small system solutions, regional economic development
- Update water supply/demand/infrastructure needs projections and maps tapping into experts from all sectors
- Develop Long-range infrastructure financing strategy
- Identify game-changing innovations and technologies
- Develop policy recommendations and technical information through partner and stakeholder dialogue



OCWP Local Engagement Meetings

Five-Meeting Progression- local stakeholders develop local solutions

- Share results of statewide supply/demand/gap analyses and infrastructure needs survey
- Anticipated water challenges from local stakeholders hear from all water use sectors: *industry, municipalities, tribes, ag. and energy producers, etc.*
- Dialogue with water planning experts, state legislators, economists, city chambers, government agencies, and others
- Gain feedback on high-level issues identified by topic-specific focus groups
- Summarize strategies and recommendations



Oklahoma Flood Resiliency Plan

Call to Action in response to 2019 Record Flooding

- 6 deaths
- 416 communities impacted
- 40 Federal Disaster Declared Counties
- Widespread damage to homes, agriculture, roads, bridges, dams and levees
- \$100 million price tag





Oklahoma Flood Resiliency Plan

SB 1269 (S. Rader, R. Sims) directs OWRB to prepare and adopt a comprehensive state flood plan.

- Provide for orderly preparation for and response to flood conditions to protect against the loss of life and property;
- Be a guide to state and local flood control policy; and
- Contribute to water development when possible



Investing in Water Infrastructure

Oklahoma Emergency Drought Fund \$63 million over 2 yrs.

- Commission approved ag. cost-share program; through OCC's 77 districts
- Eligible projects: water well drilling, pipelines, pasture taps, watering facilities, cover crop, forage, biomass, pond clean out, hay transportation

Federal Bipartisan Infrastructure Law

\$240 million over 5 yrs.

Through Clean Water and Drinking Water State Revolving Funds

FEMA High Hazard Dam Rehabilitation Grants \$3 million over 4 yrs.

65/35 federal cost share

American Rescue Plan Act

\$503 million over 2 yrs.

- \$1.87 billion available to State of Ok.
- State ARPA Committee received \$2.7 billion in requests for water projects
- Administered through OWRB

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

As of February 28, 2023, the OWRB Financial Assistance Division had approved 2,496 loans and grants for a total of \$6.25 billion. These financing opportunities have saved Oklahoma communities an estimated \$1.47 billion over conventional financing options.

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

American Rescue Plan Act Grants



The competitive grant application period is closus.

Governor Kevin Stitt approved \$100 million in one-time grant funding from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) to address water, wastewater, and dam rehabilitation infrastructure projects across Oklahoma, to be administered by the Oklahoma Water Resources Board. The approved funding will be allocated as follows:

- · \$10 million for pre-selected dam rehabilitation projects;
- \$40 million for water/wastewater projects by communities with a population greater than 7,000 or to rural water districts with more than 2,300 non-pasture taps
 - · Funding is limited to \$2 million per applicant
 - · Requires a 50% cost share
- \$50 million for water/wastewater projects by communities with a population of 7,000 or less or to rural water districts with less than 2,300 populations takes

New Intent to Drill Notification System

- New rule that became effective in 2022 for all non-domestic (commercial) water wells
- Supported by Oklahoma Well Drillers Advisory Council
- Protects landowners from improper drilling, well spacing encroachment/interference, and source water contamination
- Driller notifies OWRB of authorized well location and water permit prior to drilling well
- Verifies driller is licensed and certified to install well
- Simple online application form and timely approval by rule



2023 State Water Legislation

Water Right Application Process (HB 2053) establishes rules and standards for protests to groundwater right applications pertaining to interested parties and legal actions

Statewide Drought and Flood Plan Act of 2023 (HB 2293) formalizes interagency coordination, recommendations for update of drought mitigation procedures, floodplain mapping, flood infrastrucure needs assessment, annual report to legislature

2023 ARPA Dollars (HB 2942/2888) ~\$67 million to Port of Inola, Tribal match, and OWRB ARPA grant programs

Emergency Drought Commission (HB 1847/HB 1004) ~\$63 million over two years

New Hazard Mitigation Revolving Fund (HB 1928) to create new loan/grant programs administered by Oklahoma Emergency Mgmt and OWRB

<u>Position #503</u> – Water-Related Federal Rules, Regs., Directives, Orders, Policies

Seeks to protect states from federal overreach relating to:

- Appropriation/allocation of water within state border (withdrawal, control, use, or distribution of water)
- Interstate compact/negotiated rights agreements
- Application, development and/or implementation of rules, laws, and regulations related to water

Position #490 –water quality standards and federal reserved rights for tribes:

- Urges EPA to fully consider legal/admin. issues associated with promulgating nationwide tribal baseline water quality standards
- Opposes shifting federal trustee responsibilities to the states




Western Water Cooperative Committee

Water Resources Development Act 2022

- Established to ensure U.S. Army Corp of Engineers flood control project operation in 17 Western states aligns with state water rights and water law
- Platform for dialogue for states to work out water appropriation and other issues with the Army Corps
- Increased collaboration and transparency will facilitate improved delivery of policies, water management, and recreational opportunities
- State governor and attorney general appoint two members
- Representatives with water policy and management experience and can be same as WSWC appointee




Groundwater Availability Studies





OWRB Water Information and Data Portal

- OWRB monitoring network (water quality/quantity) from routine sampling events and continuous field-deployed sensors
- Downloadable raw data, reports, graphs, and charts
- Maps available for site selection and for data visualization
- Data is used for water planning, public safety, research, flood/drought forecasting, etc...
