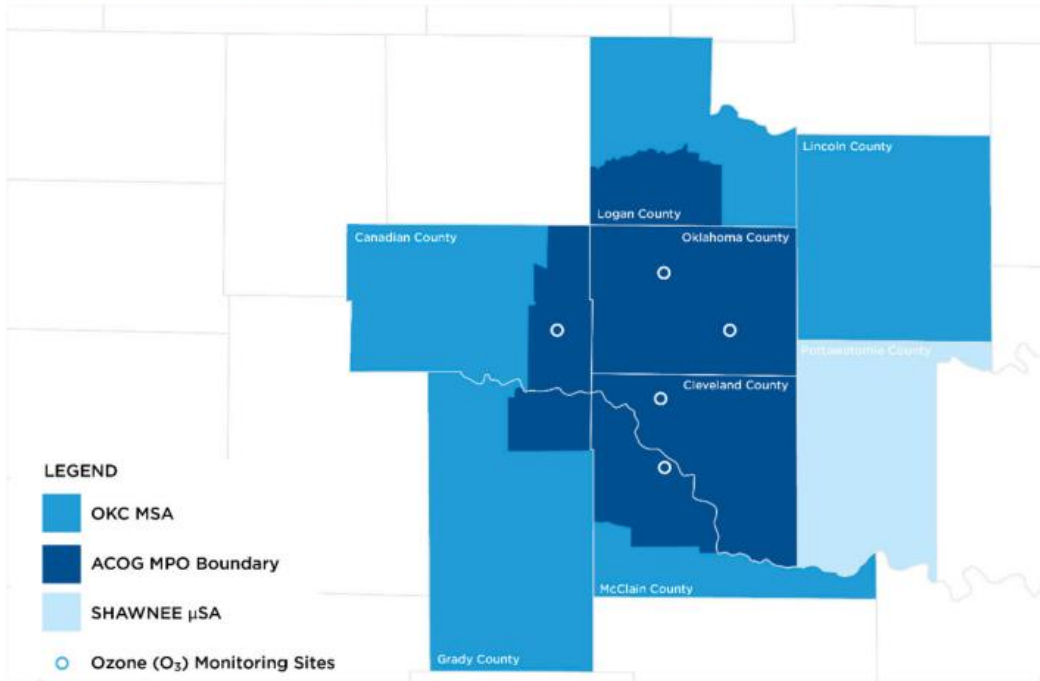
Cost of Nonattainment Study

- Partnered with Greater Oklahoma City Chamber, ODOT, Department of Commerce, and EFO
- Focus on regional economic costs if Oklahoma City is designated nonattainment for ozone
- **Between \$9.5 to \$15.2 billion** in economic costs
- Burden on citizens, transportation and ODEQ

Areas of Focus

- Review current air quality status for the Oklahoma City area, focus on ozone
- **Emission Inventory Review for NO_x and VOC (focus on NEI years)**
- **Summary of local Sustainability Plans and expected projects to lower emissions**
- Summary of upcoming regulations that could reduce emissions in the area
- Transportation emissions and expected changes

Action Items and Tool Kits

- Air Quality Action Toolbox for local governments and private sector to lower emissions during ozone season
- Propose various incentives to lower emissions in the area, including policy and procedure
- Additional actions during ozone alert days
